LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Oct. 11 (AP)—"The camels are coming! And by 'the camels' are meant the 'aroused and articulate order of infuriated camels' officially incorporated under Arkansas law today by 50 prominent young business men and women of Arkansas to work for repeal of the prohibition amendment through the medium of ridicule.

Started county officials in Pulaski circuit court saw this in the incorporation papers: "We, as infuriated camels, have seen enough. We do not believe that prohibition will be or even can be enforced. We are willing to be honest about it, and acknowledge the failure of the experiment."

The organization opened headquarters in a Little Rock office building and plans to create a national following through "popularity of its purposes" and "carry the movement forward by its own weight."

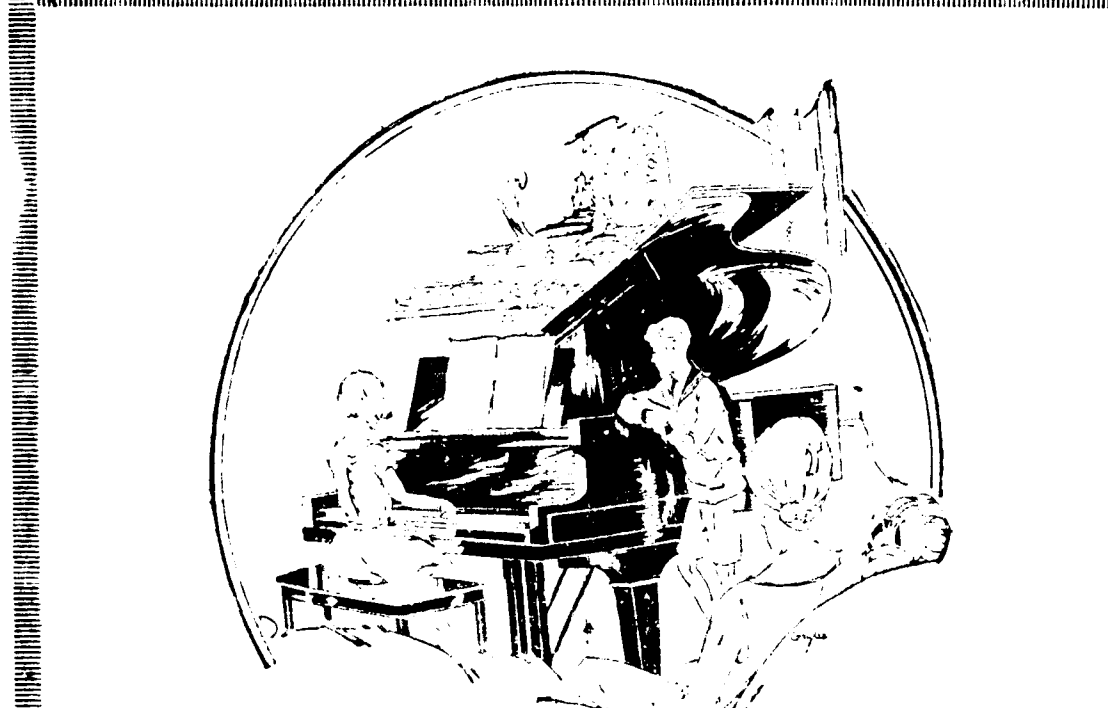
WOULD ENCOURAGE SALE OF HELIUM GAS TO OTHER NATIONS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (AP)—The exportation of helium gas for use in foreign airships is favored by the American government.

This was definitely established through an utterance of President Hoover, who yesterday said that far from hampering the export of the administration wished to encourage its sale abroad. He spoke to clear up what he held was a general misunderstanding since the R-101 disaster, on the government's attitude.

At the same time he took occasion to answer critics on the authorized reduction of 4800 men in the navy's enlisted personnel. Those who held this would cause unemployment, pointed out the reduction will come gradually through expiration of enlistments and through deaths.

GREAT MARKET FOR TEXTILES It Is Latin America And Should Be Developed by Large Scale Mergers POLAND SPRING, Me., Oct. 11 (AP)—Large scale mergers among the means of organizing the producers and sellers of the cotton textile industry were advocated today by Floyd W. Jefferson, temporary chairman of the textile export association of the United States. In an address before the annual meeting of the national association of cotton manufacturers, he said only the alert, the vigorous, the progressive will realize the foreign and domestic opportunities for expanding markets. He declared cotton goods could be sold abroad in tremendous volume, particularly in South America, and believed the United States would wind a way to do it. "In 1929 the export of manufactured articles by the United States far exceeded shipments of raw material," he said, "but in the realm of cotton goods we are lagging far behind, exporting ten times as much raw cotton as cotton cloth." "The reason for this is our lack of proper distributive agencies, intelligent, efficient, modern methods and employed in domestic distribution would be rewarded by increased business. "Economists believe that Europe will gain trade ascendancy in Africa and that Japan will control the Orient, and that Latin America is the logical market for our export development. If that is true, our ambassadors and consuls and our trade representatives should understand the temperament, customs and requirements of these neighbors and should be able to speak Spanish, French and German. Good business depends on good relations and good relations require sympathetic understanding, appreciation, and tolerance. I am pointing out some of the difficulties, but I am telling you nevertheless that your goods can be sold abroad in tremendous volume especially in Latin America, and I believe that the United States will find the way."

WILMINGTON, Del. Oct. 11 (AP)—Josiah Marvel, democratic national committeeman from Delaware and president of the American bar association, died suddenly of a heart attack at his home near here early today. Mr. Marvel, 64, succumbed a short time after the arrival of a physician at his home, "Hantocook," Greenville. His death came as a distinct shock to his family and friends. Active in the democratic party's state and national affairs for years, Mr. Marvel was defeated for the nomination as U. S. senator by Thomas F. Byard at the democratic state convention on September 16 last. Mr. Marvel was backed by the "drys" while Mr. Byard ran as a pronounced "wet." A long and distinguished career in the legal profession was climaxed on August 22 of this year when Mr. Marvel was elected unanimously president of the American bar association at its convention in Chicago. He succeeded Henry Upson Sims of Birmingham, Ala. Mr. Marvel was prominent in Delaware law and political circles and in the conduct of the democratic party. He also was noted as an orator and an authority on the constitution. Mr. Marvel was married April 20, 1898 to Miss Mary Jackson, a daughter of Congressman W. H. Jackson, of Maryland. They had six children, Jackson, Josiah 4th, Jane, Mary, Ann and William. ATTENTION LADIES! THEATRE MANAGERS INDICTED AT LAUREL LAUREL, Miss., Oct. 11 (AP)—Officers of the Strand Amusement company, operators of the Strand and Arabian theatres, motion picture houses, have been indicted on three counts each for operation of the two theatres on Sunday by the grand jury which has made its final report to Judge W. Joe Pack in circuit court here. Those indicted are Charles Green, Ben Schneider and W. S. Taylor. The theatres have been operated without charge on Sunday for several weeks. Numerous other violations of the Sunday laws were brought to the attention of the grand jury but no other indictments were made. This was explained in the grand jury report in the following words: "We have had a great amount of evidence before us as to the violation of the Sabbath day and it is alarming to every member of this grand jury of the growing spirit among the people and even the christian people to disregard, set aside and desecrate Sunday. We have returned a few indictments, but we had evidence of over seventy violations of the Sunday law, but of our own motion and without the advice or suggestion on the part of any person or attorney have referred these seventy or eighty cases to the county court, to the justice of peace court and to the mayor's court where they can be handled, tried and disposed of with speed and without much cost to the taxpayers."
